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Week 9: Advocacy: Debate Competition

Duration: 45 minutes

Week 9 Introduction (Video):

- Welcome members back and briefly recap Week 8.
- Define and provide an overview of Week 9's focus advocacy through debating.
- Discuss the importance for teens to advocate, debate and take action on global climate change, transportation, and energy challenges and solutions.
- Share more details on the CoT Final Project Competition.
- Summarize this week's activities.

Objectives: The objectives of this session are to:

- Increase understanding and awareness of climate change, transportation, and energy complexities.
- Empower members to strengthen their capabilities to advocate, debate, and persuade others to take action to address global climate change, transportation, and energy challenges.
- Provide more details on the CoT Final Project Competition.

Facilitator Time Commitment: 3 hours maximum

Facilitator Instructions:

- Set up:
 - Videos: Open an Internet window and have the Introduction video ready to play. There is no Learning video this week. - Some teens may join individually and others may join in a group at a local club. This may present some challenges with individual exercises and activities. Ensure that teens in the same room still have access to electronic devices to complete their assignments.
- Club/Organization facilitators may want to participate and help facilitate the discussion with the teens.

- In-person facilitation:
 - Arrive at least 15-30 minutes before the start of the session to set-up and prepare.
 - Teens should have access to electronic devices for individual assignments.

- Introduction Video: Begin the weekly session by playing the weekly BGCGW CoT Introduction video.
 - Set-up: It is recommended to set up the teen space before the teens join, test the projector/TV connection and play the video to check the video and audio features
 - Ensure that teens have access to electronic/mobile devices with an Internet connection.
 - The video will welcome teen members to the program and provide a brief overview of the CoT Program, the calendar of events, and how the weekly sessions are designed.

- Learning Video: There is no learning video this week.
- Exercise or Activity: Advocacy Skills Practice
 - (All Facilitators):
 - Download and/or print the *Advocacy Debate Competition Worksheet* for your group (located at the end of Week 9 below).
 - Group Assignments:
 - (In-person Groups) Divide your teens into two groups and have them complete the Worksheet together.
 - (Virtual Groups) For virtual groups (use Zoom breakout rooms)

- Using the Five Step Advocacy Process, each group will come up with an issue that matters to them and practice how they would advocate for the issue.
- Each group will complete their *Advocacy Debate Competition Worksheet* and develop a 2 minute advocacy debate video to defend their position.
- (Facilitators): Submit all group Advocacy Debate Competition Worksheets and Videos to: cot@bgcgw.org. (Teen names must be listed on the Advocacy Debate Competition Worksheet) in the event their team wins a prize.
- Winners will be announced during Week 10 or after the club/organization completes Week 9.

5 min	 Exercise: Advocacy Debate Competition Using the Five Step Advocacy Process in Week 8. Divide the teen members into two groups. One group will argue <u>for</u> the issue and the other group will argue <u>against</u> the issue. Members will be provided an advocacy debate scenario and position that they must defend and advocate for. Each group will research their advocacy scenario to collaborate and develop a strong debate argument. Each group will prepare a 2-minute advocacy debate video to defend their position. 	 against the issue or topic, (3) why your group is for or against by providing 2-3 key points to support your argument (why this issue is important, what will, and (4) what will make the issue better, and (5) what action you would like taken. The group in each session who (1) submits their video by the deadline and (2) presents the strongest argument will win prizes. (Teen names in the group must be listed on the <i>Advocacy Debate Competition Worksheet</i>) in the event their team wins a prize. Winners will be announced in Week 10.

List Group Members:						
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Debate Context: In Week 3, we discussed different types of renewable and non-renewable energy sources and how they affect global climate change. Non-renewable energy sources contribute to climate change but remain a common way of fueling transportation systems such as cars, buses, and more. You are a policy maker and you must persuade other policy makers on how to deal with vehicle energy-efficiency.

Debate Question: Should we raise gasoline prices to encourage a shift to energy-efficient vehicles?

Group 1 (For): We <u>SHOULD</u> raise gasoline prices to encourage a shift to energyefficient vehicles.

Group 2 (Against): We <u>SHOULD NOT</u> raise gasoline prices to encourage a shift to energy-efficient vehicles.

Instructions: Each group will complete the Five Step Advocacy Process discussed in the Learning video (<u>https://youtu.be/fCjwA67THIc?si=DYPzC4YW8-Sxw2yQ</u>) to advocate for or against the issue in the scenario.

1. Step 1: Identify and Clarify

Identify: Is your group Advocating: For _____ or Against _____ the issue?

Clarify: What is the specific debate issue/problem:

2. Step 2: Reach Out: Who can best help address this issue?

3. Step 3: Have Courage: Share 2-3 key points or statements to support your argument and share why others should take your position.

4. Step 4: Speak Up: What action would you like taken to still address climate change? (This is your group's call to action)

5. Step 5: Reflect: Record your group's 2-minute video with your group for the

competition. Your video must include the following.

- Share the names of all your group members.
- Briefly summarize the general issue in the scenario.
- State whether your group is advocating <u>for</u> or <u>against</u> the issue and WHY.
- Share 3 strong points to support your argument <u>for</u> or <u>against</u> the issue. (Your goal is to persuade the audience to your point of view.)
- Share your call to action (tell us what important action you want taken) and how to still address climate change.

Submission: Facilitators should submit each group's *Advocacy Debate Competition Worksheet* and Video to: cot@bgcgw.org by *Friday, March 29, 2024 (or the Friday of the week you* complete Week 9) at 12 noon (EST) to be considered for the competition.
